This Communications Training is very special and unique in that it takes place in a month when the global community commemorates the 9<sup>th</sup> International Mandela Day on the 18<sup>th</sup> of July 2017, which is celebrated under the theme: **#Action against poverty!** 

The National Union declared the 18<sup>th</sup> of July as the International Mandela Day, to honour the legacy of South Africa's first democratic president, Nelson Mandela, through volunteering and community service. This day must therefore serve to bring people around the world to fight poverty and promote peace, reconciliation and cultural diversity.

We must emphasise that Mandela Day is not just on 18<sup>th</sup>, and the spirit of service to one another must not lapse after July. We must all be reminded that it's not just about doing 67 minutes of good, and that we must dedicate every day to bring about sustainable social change in the lives of our fellow citizens in need.

The more than 20 000 women led by Lilian Ngoyi, Helen Josephs, Francis Baard and many others, assembled in Pretoria to petition against the country's pass laws that required black people, under the Population Registrations Act to carry an internal passport which served to maintain population segregation and biased economic positioning by the then colonial regime.
